Hamster History!

Habitat Requirements

Proper Diet, Snacks

Seeds, nuts, grains, and vegetables should be included in your hamster's diet. A mix of grains, nuts, fruits, and vegetables should be offered daily. Hamsters also require protein in their diet, which can be provided in the form of mealworms, crickets, or other insects.

Small pieces of fresh fruits, vegetables, and nuts can be offered as occasional snacks, as long as they are given in moderation.



Is my pet healthy?

Look for a glossy coat of fur with no bald patches or balding.

Check for bright, alert eyes and clean ears.

Make sure your hamster has a healthy appetite and is active and inquisitive.
